Uncovering History: Enid's First Osteopath

Thanks to an old photograph of the corner of Main and Independence, we discovered Dr. Neva Triplett, believed to be Enid's first osteopath. Riley Janzen shared this photo and inspired us to investigate. Riley, and his wife Stella, own The Felt Bird, located where Dr. Triplett's office used to stand. Dr. Triplett's family owned the building until 1980 when Neva's son bequeathed the property to his daughter.

Neva True Smiley was born in 1871 in Memphis, Missouri, Growing up in Missouri and in close proximity (39 miles) to the birth of osteopathic medicine (Kirksville, MO), it's not surprising that young Neva would be interested in learning about this new form of "healing." While many professional careers were closed off to women in the late 1800s, osteopathic medicine welcomed women from day one and accepted them as equals alongside men. In fact, the first class to graduate from the American School of Osteopathy in 1892 included six women. Neva married Orin Triplett in 1895 and they had a son in 1897. Just months after giving birth, she enrolled in the American School of Osteopathy in Kirksville, and

studied under A.T. Still – the father of osteopathic medicine. Neva graduated in 1899. By 1900, Dr. Triplett, husband Orin and baby Richard had moved to Enid – reasons unknown - and continued her work as an osteopath on Enid's downtown square. There is

some indication that her husband remained unemployed throughout most of their marriage, perhaps taking care of their young son. Early Enid city directories list various office locations for Dr. Triplett, through the years including 124 S. Independence (next door to where the NW Oklahoma Osteopathic Foundation's office is today) 1107 Monroe and 219 Broadway. The couple lived at 1505 W. Maine for a period of time and then 601 W. Maine where they raised their son, Richard Lee Triplett. It appears obvious that the young physician was passionate about her work. She helped organize the Oklahoma Osteopathic Association (founded in 1902). She served in several leadership

positions including a term as the





organization's president in 1904. She was also instrumental in bringing the Southwest Osteopathic Conference to Enid in 1914. The conference included presentations by osteopathic physicians from Colorado, Texas, Kansas, Illinois and Missouri. Dr. Triplett and her Enid colleagues offered a "Better Babies" program in 1917 examining 50 babies and providing their parents educational information about the benefits of osteopathic treatments

Numerous news stories from the early 1900s and articles from osteopathic publications detail some of her work with patients. She of-



ten made house calls and travelled to Waukomis and Blackwell. One article, published in a Blackwell, OK, newspaper in 1918, claimed she helped cure a young Phillips University student who had gone blind and deaf. The cure included a series of manipulative treatments. Sadly, Dr. Triplett died voung. She took her own life, by throwing herself in front of a moving train, in Enid, in 1920. She was 48 years old. An Enid newspaper described her as Enid's pioneer osteopath who "has been a help to the poor. She has given every effort for the uplift of humanity."

The NW Oklahoma Osteopathic Foundation has plans to document more of Enid's osteopathic history, so stay tuned and follow us on facebook for updates.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

2019

This past June, the Foundation presented grants to the following organizations:



CDSA - \$5,000 Newborn Safe Sleep Kits

While great work has been done to reduce infant mortality in Garfield County, the rate is still higher than the national average. This grant will help fund Newborn Safe Sleep Kits printed in English, Spanish, and Marshallese. These kits will be given to new mothers before they leave the hospital.

Loaves and Fishes - \$5,000 Nutritional Supplements

Loaves and Fishes became aware of the fact that both hospitals had noted that the majority of readmissions, for patients with COPD, was tied to a secondary diagnosis of malnutrition. The organization immediately wanted to help. This grant will allow Loaves and Fishes to have nutritional supplements available to those in need.

Denny Price Family YMCA - \$5,000 Healthy Weight And Your Child

This evidence-based program is being used in Y's throughout the United States. The 25-session program engages the child and a parent or guardian so that, together, they can understand how the home environment and other factors influence healthy choices. The program is based on Mind, Exercise, Nutrition...Do It (MEND)

Comunity Grants

INTEGRIS Foundation -\$5,000 CANServe Program

This program is designed to meet the dietary needs of cancer patients during the first week of treatment by providing a free meal, each day, for five days. The meals are perfectly portioned, hot and healthy, and are nutrient appropriate.



Rural Health Projects -\$10,000 AHEC Scholars Program

The grant will help support osteopathic medical students enrolled in the AHEC Scholars Program. The program helps train, recruit, and retain health professionals to our area through additional curriculum and connections to our community.

Additional Community Grants

were given in November (to meet the Foundation's annual distribution requirement) to the following:

Oklahoma Blood Institute - \$50,000 Building Campaign

The Northwest Oklahoma Osteopathic Foundation helped kick off the NW Oklahoma Blood Institute's capital campaign by presenting them with a gift of \$50,000. The first phase of the project will feature new construction and provide a covered area for loading and unloading. Phase 2 will remodel existing space.

Oklahoma Osteopathic Association - \$5,000 Podcast Series

The Oklahoma Osteopathic Association will soon be launching a podcast series. Programs will be a mix of many topics, such as interesting medical stories, physician highlights, legislative updates, etc. The series is designed to engage younger physicians and provide valuable content to all OOA members. The podcast will launch this Spring. Fun fact: Enid's very own Lynn Phillips, DO will be the voice of the program.



INTEGRIS Bass Baptist Health Center \$10,000 Baxter Care Fund

This program helps patients, that qualify, get the medication and some of the equipment they need. The fund is named after longtime administrator Gene Baxter.

In total the Foundation presented more than \$95,000 in funding.

Grant requests are due March 1st. The submissions are then reviewed by committee and funds are awarded in June.For more information, go to www. nwoof.org.
